aked as a jaybird, I gazed out over the expanse Ward. It was an oddly thrilling way to start the day: up to my ears in piping hot water, looking down upon the Lego-like jumble of the world's biggest city from 42 stories above the ground.

"I could stay here all day," I thought, before reluctantly emerging from the marble tub to shave and dress. Then, over a coffee and croissant at the Green Hills Spa Lounge down the hall, I looked up from my newspaper to check my watch. I still had time to cycle to the office. Within minutes, I was racing toward the Marunouchi business district, just a few blocks away.

As the residential side of a unique, mixed-use development, Atago Green Hills Forest Tower offers unparalleled convenience for people who work in the city center. Located between Onarimon and Kamiyacho stations, on the Mita and Hibiya lines, respectively, it's close enough to the CBD to cycle or jog to work.

This intuitive service impressed me from the moment the desk staff briefed me on the facilities at check-in, before leaving me to enjoy my complimentary welcome basket of sweet goodies while watching a storm roll in across Tokyo Bay from my balcony.

I soon fell into an enjoyable rhythm during my stay, underscoring the ease with which new arrivals can quickly slip into their lives in Tokyo.

I would kick off the day with a swim or soak in the hot tub, followed by a healthy breakfast before work. Depending on the time I returned in the evenings, I would either grab a quick bite at the restaurant or head out for a run around the nearby Imperial

Palace. Evenings were rounded off with a contemplative stroll through the quiet grounds of the temple next door or a last-minute rejuvenating massage before the spa closed.

"Stop by any time for a chat," one of the nurses at the residence's on-site medical clinic cheerfully called out to me one evening. "I'm always here."
